


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
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This is Rosie.




This is her sister Violet.


Rosie is well all over. Violet has a poorly heart.

Rosie hops and skips and jumps a lot. Violet hops and skips and jumps a bit.




Rosie goes red but keeps on playing. Violet goes blue and stops for a while.

She wears a mask to help her breathe. Then Rosie feels blue too.




When Violet is better she comes home. Then Rosie and Violet are in the pink - until the next time.




One day Violet went so blue that even the mask didn't help.
